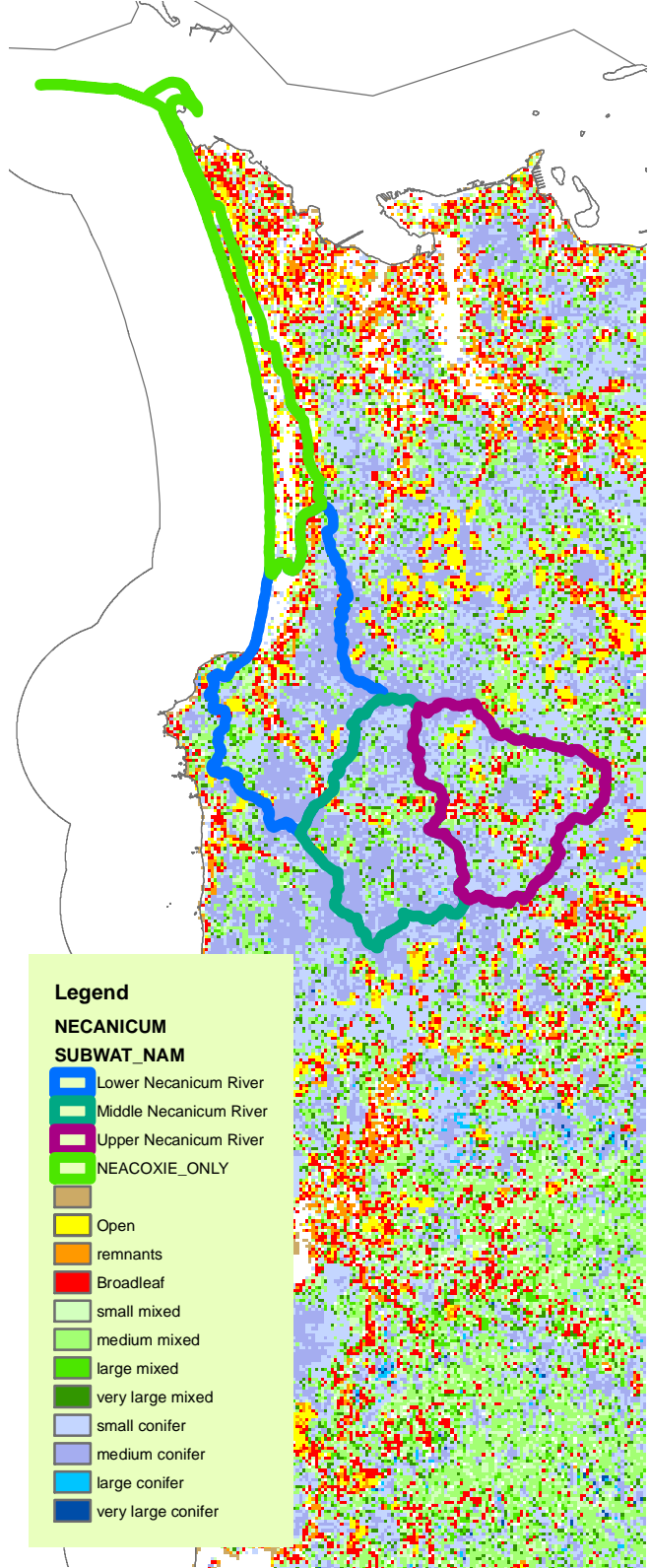


The north Oregon coast still retains some of the richest and most productive natural areas and wildlife habitat in the region. The North Coast Land Conservancy, Inc. has worked since 1986 as a land trust with citizens, agencies, and municipalities to preserve some of these precious places.

The NCLC works to further our mission through land acquisition, conservation easements, partnerships, and community outreach. This can include: discussing with a private property owner the economic benefits of protecting land through donation, advising a developer about the benefits of a wetland management plan, advising other organizations as they work to preserve an ecologically sensitive area, or providing a public symposium on little known aspects of the coast. Conservation is accomplished with willing private landowners as well as with cities and counties.

NCLC's conservation work is not limited to land acquisition and management. Symposia and interpretive hikes focusing on aspects of local natural history are provided each year. In addition, NCLC serves as the primary management entity for the Gateway to Discovery Natural History center in partnership with several other conservation and natural history organizations.

Circle Creek Property - Natural Resource Features:
 The property has an expansive meadow used by elk and waterfowl. An extensive Sitka spruce forested wetland along the western boundary connects this property to the Tillamook Head ecosystem. Circle Creek and smaller tributaries meander through the property, providing habitat for salmon and the Red-legged frog.
